The results of this are then analysed and actions are put in place. ▪ We employ Peaceful Problem Solving strategies at all times to resolve conflict and teach the children the importance of listening and empathy for others. ▪ Class expectations are agreed through group discussion at the beginning of each academic year. Behaviour and expectations are regularly discussed with School Council and Pupil Voice throughout the year. ▪ The school’s Positive Behaviour Policy reflects British Values. ▪ Pupils are encouraged to accept responsibility for their own behaviour and reflect on their choices.

We give to those in need: CAFOD, NSPCC, Chestnut Tree Hospice Love in a Box, Food and Money for St Anne’s Day Centre and Year 4 children make sandwiches weekly for a local homeless centre. - We celebrate Black History Month every October, when the contributions and achievements of black people are celebrated and studied across the school in classes and assemblies. - We enhance the understanding of other faiths through our RE work. Every class studies Judaism and Islam every year and classes in the school visit the local synagogue and mosque. - We are a Fair Trade school with a Fairtrade Council that meets at least once a term who make whole school decisions and ensure that learning about Fairtrade is given a high profile within their class. - We have an Eco council who meet to discuss local and global issues. - In EPR, every year group studies a ‘Good to be Me’ topic and an Equalities topic with a range of foci, such as family diversity, Gypsy Roma Traveller education, disability education, gender stereotypes and discrimination. - We use the term ‘grown ups’ as a general term rather than ‘mums and dads’ to refer to children’s significant adults so that children who live with one parent; 2 mums; 2 dads; foster parents or who live with extended family do not feel that their own family make-up is not included. We ask club providers to use this language too. Not only do we avoid certain language, we also actively talk about different family types and children regularly hear all family types recognised in our language. We buy books that include a variety of family types so everybody feels seen. - We realise that there are financial inequalities between families at Cottessmore St Mary and, via our Poverty proofing audit, aim to ensure no family or child is excluded from a school event or activity for financial reasons and that we do not add stress or embarrassment to families - In Relationships and Sex Education, we teach the children that babies are conceived in different ways (conception teaching formally happens in Year 5 but questions can begin before then and will be answered in an age-appropriate way) – a parent/carer meeting always takes place before RSE lessons take place. - We recognise that children who are adopted into families or fostered often have specific needs and may need additional care. We are sensitive to areas of the curriculum / the calendar year that may affect children. We know that change and transition are sensitive times for children with attachment difficulties and will work with parents/carers to support this. - As part of a wider school drive to develop our inclusivity and celebration of diversity, we made sure our class saints represent the world and our school community. We wanted a balance of women and men, individuals from a range of places and ethnicities and including saints from our locality. - Throughout the year, children across the school receive workshops run by arts education company, Bigfoot. The programme aims to encourage young people to understand that you are never too young to make a stand against racial injustice. - Staff have regular training on racial literacy to help develop their knowledge and be effective facilitators. - We have visits from Black authors local to our area. - Each year we update our Racial Literacy and Anti-Racist strategy - We have an Equalities Objectives Strategy so inclusion is a priority
